GERMANY TO DESTINY

1940's War and Wonders


Anke and Hardy were both born and raised near Cologne, Germany. Today they are in awe and still can't believe that they have arrived in this Paradise Village of Balboa Island after 50 years of adventurous voyage over hill and dale. They're also thankful to God to proudly celebrate a big 50th wedding anniversary.

This happy Balboa couple recalled that the war and post-WW-II years were tough on our parents, yet we as kids made the best of it. Even the bombers flying overhead were an interesting spectacle in our village as we played in burned out weapons carriers and in the woods and streams.

We watched as cautious American tanks bypassed defenses and friendly soldiers gave us kids candy and confiscated watches. Later we went from farm to farm to beg for milk and apples, traded rabbits for hand-made skis, worked in the fields to harvest potatoes, wore recycled parachute clothing and shoes. We were poor yet did not realize it. Also, generous care packages from our relatives in the US made quite a difference, even the direct trade for a large hand made pretzel for Hardy's 7th birthday.

1950's Start Your Engines!

Note that Hardy's Family Tree had strong branches in Mid-West farming communities since the 1800's. So it was no wonder that, after achieving journeyman status in the steel industry, he immigrated from Western Germany to Illinois. Of course only after the NSA checked him out thoroughly for about a year. Off to America in 1959 ((paid an extra \$50 to fly by jet plane)

he worked for Caterpillar briefly and was stunned by a massive lay-off. He quickly joined the US Air Force to learn language, customs, culture and SOS. Where do you think they sent him? To Germany of course where Hardy later worked for the Stars & Stripes newspaper in logistics---sounds better than just as a driver. At a relative's house party Hardy suddenly meets Anke, this beautiful blond girl of his dreams. To make it short, they married in 1966 'in a fever'. Pharmacist Anke labored to make ends meet by also jobbing as a media developer. Danke, Germany, for all your Gemuetlichkeit! Where is adventure, opportunity and the sun?

Needles and Pins late 1960's

Ojai, California, 'here we come' in 1968 receiving solid help from several people, including brother John and even our super landlords Floyd and Lydia. Now, according to Anke and Hardy, the



good but tough life really begins working 2-3 jobs at times: Stints as a seamstress in a sweatshop with speeding machine needles often piercing her fingers, selling avocados and roustabouting in

the oil patch to name a few job opportunities.



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Our American Dream unfolded: We bought our first house in Ventura, just in time for our happiest moment, the arrival of our Son Andrew! Of course, that meant, even more, work with 'night shifts' here and preparing for bigger roles than oil patch roustabout: Numerous Evening College classes under the GI Bill.

Hot and Heavy 1970 to 2017

We experienced the first of many happy transfers and moved to Glendale in 1971, working in Mechanical Engineering yet kept taking night classes to earn our American Dream. Top Engineer Gene remarked: "Isn't it strange that we work side-by-side while I flew right over you in 1945 as a turret gunner in a B-17 bomber?"

Anyway, Glendale was beautiful yet much too hot for us in the Summer and we moved to Costa Mesa and Huntington Beach in the 70's to cool off. There we started a flower shop, restaurant, catering/wedding service, plus our first antique business. Anke is an antiques expert and states that a real antique has to be over 100 years old~~otherwise its a collectible (this is what she calls her husband). Of course Hardy counters with Groucho Marx: "I got married by a Judge---I should have asked for a Jury"!

Disaster struck: Transfer to Bakersfield!!! We escaped to the beaches and mountains to find 'our' California. On one of those super hot Kern River days (radio in the Valley calls those torches strangely 'mild'), I asked Anke: "Where would you REALLY like to live?" Anke answered without hesitation: "My dream is Balboa Island!"

Based on Walt Disney's "If you can dream it----you can do it" we bought this 1933 Balboa Island duplex in 1984 even though our realtor warned us: "Who'd want to live on this muddy old Canal?"

And yes, even the record shattering bridge replacement did not shatter our dreams! Where in the world would you ever hope to meet your Mayor, your Councilman and your Public Works Director in your tiny front yard?






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He is $13 \frac{1}{2}$ years old.

Chico is doing very well right now, but the tumor will grow back so we have to watch for any signs of that. As for the last year and eight months, it has been a blessing.

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

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For this month's Restaurant Review, we traveled down the coast to **Andrea**, at **The Resort at Pelican Hill.** Andrea Ristorante is not simply somewhere to eat, but a refined local destination for stunning decor, amazing views, and an unforgettable culinary experience.

The dining area of Andrea features a light coastal decor, creating a chic yet understated and relaxed atmosphere. We arrived early and took advantage of the coastal panoramas and the beautiful sunsets from the ocean view terrace.

Our guests this evening were Shirley & Noel Pepys, David & Barbara Beek, and Bob & Tami Hanna.

Upon arrival, we were delighted by the sounds of live music and old standards played and sung by a very talented trumpet musician.

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at Pelican Hill



Our server explained the evening's menu selections and provided some suggestions to complement the appetizers and signature risotto dish that we all enjoyed that evening. The appetizers included perfectly prepared scallops and a uniquely grilled peach and tomato dish.

The signature risotto is made from seven-year, barrel aged aquarelle (rice) with porcini mushrooms. Acquerello, a superior form of extra-quality Carnaroli rice, is produced and aged in very limited supply in the Piedmont region of Northern Italy. The risotto was prepared in the kitchen and finished tableside in a 50-pound wheel of aged Parmesan cheese. The hot risotto was poured into a center cavity in the wheel. The Parmesan cheese was shaved into the risotto, where it melted into the mix. The mixture was laden into a small metallic serving bowl where truffles were shaved on to the top. Fabulous!

This preparation has become a signature dish of the restaurant and for good reason. The aroma of the risotto permeates the air as it nears the table coupled with the presentation by the server makes for a more memorable experience. The risotto was rich and creamy with just the right amount of firmness. A satisfying touch of the mineral flavor the mushrooms give invokes the earthiness and a smell of the wild forest.

We enjoyed the grilled European Sea Bass with honey glazed endive, roasted potatoes, lemon oil and parsley dressing. The Branzino is often called a European Sea-Bass, It's about the size and shape of a medium trout. Not easily found on most menus. The presentation was very nice. Two well-sized fillets over the roasted potatoes. The skin crisp and well seasoned with a distinctive char. The fish was cooked and seasoned perfectly and came out of the kitchen warm, validating that our meals were timed properly and reached the table at their preferred temperatures. The meat was flaky white and moist. The honey glazed endive was an interesting compliment.

We also enjoyed the braised veal Osso Bucco with creamy polenta, porcini mushrooms, and confit tomatoes. The meat was so tender it literally fell off the bone and was seasoned to perfection. The chicken scaloppini with toasted orzo rapini and lemon caper sauce were tender and savory, one of my favorites. Also enjoyed was the Prime Filet Mignon with roasted carrots, asparagus, potatoes and peppercorn sauce. Delicious, tender and well seasoned.

Dinner was followed by a mélange of house made desserts which included daily made gelato and sorbet. During dessert, Chef Amodt came to the table to greet and welcome our Corona Del Mar neighborhood residents.

As always, the staff did an exemplary job of providing the best experience possible. They were always professional, the food arrived promptly, never rushed and at the right temperature. The wines were all superior choices.

Nibs White was a long-time resident of Balboa Island and author of Once Upon an Island: Tales of Early Days on Balboa Island From 1914 to 1941. In this personal narrative, he said, "Sailing was very popular from the earliest days. The weather could not be better, with a fine trade wind almost every afternoon, and the bay calms and smooth most of the time. The ocean is especially nice, and is used extensively by the larger boats."

From the very start, Newport Harbor has seen its share of small and big boats alike. Perhaps one of

the most breathtaking sights was the annual "Flight of the Snowbirds."

This sailboat race sponsored by the Newport Harbor Yacht Club began in the 1930s. Balboa Island's own Seymour Beek began racing in the Flight when he was seven-years-old.

Although early leaders envisioned a commercial harbor, all would be awed by the lovely bay that emerged from the marshy swampland."

Today the harbor is mostly used for recreational activities and has approximately 9,000 boats, making it one of the largest recreational boat harbors on the West Coast. It used to have its fair share of maritime industries, namely boat building, shipbuilding, and commercial fishing. Some marine businesses do continue today, including harbor tours, sport fishing, whale watching, charter boats, and the Catalina Flyer ferry to Catalina Island.

The history of all things nautical has been and remains woven into the fabric that makes up Newport Harbor and Balboa Island. Visit the Museum to learn more this fascinating story.



I now rely on my best friends mothers' recipe.....I am a huge fan of them and I don't have to worry about sweating and my hair going flat. These are simple to make and easy to eat!

2 lg. Van Kamps pork and beans 34 lb. bacon cooked and chopped 3 cloves of garlic, minced 1 ½ lg. chopped onions ½ box brown sugar 34 cup ketchup 3 tablespoons yellow mustard

Fry the bacon until crisp and remove it from the pan. Reserve 6 tablespoon's of the bacon grease. Put the onion in pan with reserved grease and garlic. Cook for 10 to 15 minutes. Slowly add the brown sugar, ketchup and mustard. Bring to a boil, then add the beans. Add in the chopped bacon. Simmer for a few minutes and then put into a baking dish. Bake for 2 ½ hours at 300 degrees until dark and thick. I sometimes stir half way thru just to shake it up. This dish serves 10 to 12.

The greater your immunity the easier it is to fight off the germs, viruses and bacteria that come with being indoors with others more often during the cooler months.

in a number of ways, such as causing inflammation to release toxins to destroy an intruder or recognizing the lack of self-tissue in a molecule. Whether it be a cut allowing in germs, eating a `piece of under cooked chicken or breathing in the sneeze from a fellow theatre goer, a strong immune system will serve you well and keep you healthy.

> About 85% of the immune system is located in the GI track, so it makes sense to pay attention to the nutrition you take in and how well you absorb it. Friendly bacteria like those found in fermented foods, keep the intestines healthy and assist in the digestive process. They contain probiotics, live microorganisms, which control the microbial population in the gut. They crowd out the bad bacteria (like E.coli) and make room for the good guys. They also enhance the intestinal lining which protects against the immune response tofood the body would interpret as foreign objects.

Vitamins and minerals such as magnesium, zinc and D are also needed for the immune process to function properly. For example, Vitamin D3, the "sunshine vitamin", controls the immune defenses against diseases like the flu. Sufficient levels are needed to activate the killer cells that fight the viruses. Surprisingly, even here in sunny Newport Beach, 50-85% of the population is deficient in this vitamin. It's such an essential nutrient, crucial to

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

Of course, age and disease affect our resistance to infection and toxins too. But, regardless of either, there is much we can do to improve our immunity. Taking supplemental D3 and getting probiotics into our diet are two simple ones. Another interesting immune enhancer is cultivating optimism. Suzanne C Segerstrom, psychology professor and researcher at the University of Kentucky, did a highly regarded 5-year study on the correlation between optimism and immunity. She found that "a single person - with the same personality and genes - has a different immune function when he or she feels more or less optimistic".

So how do you increase your optimism? I find that if I pay attention to my self-talk, that constant voice in my head with a big tendency to criticize, it's easier to stay positive and optimistic. I also look at how I actually talk to and about other people. I try to keep that upbeat and hopeful instead of negative.

I also make a point of moving as often as possible. Now that the tourist season is over, it's easier than ever to walk around this beautiful island of ours. Exercise releases feel good endorphins which make for a happier, more favorable outlook on the future. Gratitude as an attitude works wonders as well. Just remember how fortunate we are to live on Balboa Island and you'll have what it takes to fuel optimism and enhance your immunity.





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

> Call the Newport Beach Police immediately about all suspicious activity.





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

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
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
Basically, anything that seems "out of place" for your area or for the time of day during which it is occurring may indicate criminal activity. Some of the most obvious things to watch for and report include:

- A stranger entering your neighbor's house when they are away maybe a burglar.
- Someone screaming might indicate a robbery or rape
- Offers of merchandise at ridiculously low prices are often to good to be true and might actually be stolen property.
- Anyone removing accessories, a license plate, or gasoline from a car should be reported.
- Anyone peering into parked cars may be looking to steal a car or the valuables inside.
- Persons entering or leaving a business after hours may not be workers, but burglars.
- The sound of breaking glass or a loud explosive noise might indicate an accident, burglary or vandalism.
- Persons loitering around schools, parks, secluded areas, and neighborhoods might be sex offenders waiting for a victim.



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
